Liberia Recognizes IFAD as Leading Contributor to Agriculture Development

The Liberian Government has acknowledged the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) as the top contributor to the country's agricultural sector, commending its vital support in recent years. IFAD, a specialized agency of the United Nations, is dedicated to addressing poverty and hunger in rural areas of developing countries. It is the only multilateral organization that focuses exclusively on rural economies and food security, supporting 180 member states worldwide.



Liberia's Deputy Minister of Finance for Economic Management, Dephue Zuo, highlighted that since IFAD resumed operations in Liberia in 2009—after a 20-year suspension due to the civil war—the organization has continuously provided millions of US dollars to improve food security in the country.

"We are in final discussions with all partners funding the ARREST Agenda for Inclusive Development. Given that IFAD is now the largest donor in the agriculture sector, it will take the lead in aligning strategies," Minister Zuo noted. <u>Click the link to read more</u>

Venecious Molley Champions Inclusive Investment in Agriculture, Launches Cassava Processing on 25-Hectare Farm in Bomi County

On March 11, 2025, Venecious Molley, CEO of Molley Farm, officially launched a significant cassava processing project on his 25-hectare farm in Suehn Mecca District, Bomi County. This venture marks a major expansion of his agricultural operations, which also include pig farming, poultry, and the cultivation of palm apples, fish, and palm.

At the commencement of the cassava harvest, Molley emphasized his commitment to job creation and food security in Liberia. He aims to enhance local food production and contribute to the nation's goal of self-sufficiency. Molley plans to process the cassava into super gari and fufu, supported by newly acquired processing machines that will streamline production.



The farm currently employs over 50 Liberians, whom Molley views as a vital part of his empowerment strategy. He expressed his vision for the future, noting that his farm intends to become a key supplier of pig meat to the Liberian market. In the coming years, he plans to establish a processing facility to market all his products under a single, branded label. *Read more*

Sankolo Brings New Energy to LACRA

Christopher Sankolo, the new Director General of the Liberia Agriculture Commodity Regulatory Authority (LACRA), has introduced significant reforms to revitalize the institution since taking office in April 2024.



In a telephone interview with the Liberia Agricultural and Environmental Journalists Network, Mr. Sankolo shared key updates, including the restoration of Liberia's membership in the International Coffee and Cocoa Organization (ICCO) and its reintegration into various other regional and global agreements. Among the major developments he highlighted, Sankolo pointed to the successful restoration of basic utilities—water and electricity—at the LACRA office, a critical step in improving working conditions. He also introduced new financial policies designed to combat waste and mismanagement, ensuring more responsible oversight of LACRA's resources. *Read more*

GOL and IFAD Empower CDA Field Staff to Boost Productivity

The Government of Liberia (GOL), in collaboration with the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), has provided significant logistical support to the Cooperative Development Agency (CDA) aimed at boosting agricultural productivity and enhancing market access across rural communities.



Included in the 2025 fiscal budget, the Government has supplied the CDA with a Land Cruiser jeep, eight Yamaha motorbikes, and a wide array of essential farming tools such as wheelbarrows, shovels, watering cans, and rain gear. IFAD has complemented this support by contributing three laptops and an additional three motorbikes specifically intended to enhance the supervision of cooperative groups and cocoa producers in Lofa County. <u>Read more</u>

Like many government institutions in Liberia, the Liberia Agriculture Commodity Regulatory Authority (LACRA) has faced numerous challenges over the years, including low budgetary allocations that have, at times, hampered its operations. However, under the new leadership of Director General Christopher D. Sankolo, there appears to be a renewed



commitment to enhancing the institution's operational efficiency.

In a bid to foster institutional development and effectiveness, LACRA recently hosted a threeday retreat in Zoewinta, Bong County. The retreat, which brought together key personnel of the agency, was designed to reflect on past achievements and chart a new path forward for LACRA.

The event was aimed at enhancing the agency's internal cohesion and improving its critical role in Liberia's agricultural sector. The retreat provided a platform for reflection, open discussions, and strategic planning, with a focus on strengthening collaboration and ensuring the regulatory body's operations are more efficient and resourceful.
