Mr. Boshe, former Prime Minister of Ethiopia and now a prominent voice in Africa's agricultural transformation, delivered this appeal during a three-day high-level mission to Liberia. Elephant Invasions Threaten Farming and Food Security in Gbarpolu County

Farmers in Gbaryama and Karlo towns, Bopolu District, are raising urgent alarms over repeated invasions by wild elephants, which have not only devastated their farms but are also threatening the region's fragile food security and economic resilience.

For the past two farming seasons, residents of these forest-fringed communities have endured significant losses, with elephants trampling and consuming large quantities of essential crops such as cassava, plantains, peanuts, bananas, and vegetables. Local estimates suggest the damage exceeds 150,000 Liberian dollars, plunging many farming families into economic hardship.



"Last year, we made big peanut and cassava farms, but the elephants used two days to destroy everything," lamented Old Lady Varjah Kamara, cochair of the Nenela Women's Group in Gbaryama.
