### Liberia Inaugurates Landmark Situation Room at FAO Headquarters in Rome, Italy



The Government of Liberia and the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) have officially inaugurated the Liberia Situation Room, a state-of-the-art facility located at FAO Headquarters in Rome, Italy.

The unveiling took place on the sidelines of the 44th Session of the FAO Conference, which runs from June 28 to July 4, 2025. The conference—FAO's highest governing body—meets every two years to set strategic priorities and approve the Programme of Work and Budget, with this year's focus on the 2026–2027 cycle.

The Liberia Situation Room was formally launched by FAO Director-General Dr. Qu Dongyu, who applauded Liberia's renewed physical and strategic presence at FAO after more than four decades. *Read more on this article by clicking here.* 

Say No to Hunger Co-op Sees Income Leap from L\$300K to L\$1 Million Annually, Celebrates STAR-P Impact



A major transformation is unfolding in Nimba's agriculture sector, where smallholder farmers are reaping the benefits of the *World Bank-funded Smallholder Agriculture Transformation and Revitalization Project (STAR-P)*. One standout example is *Say No to Hunger*, a local vegetable farming cooperative led by Ezekiel Sayetee, which has recorded a remarkable increase in productivity, land under cultivation, and household income.

In an exclusive interview the *Liberia Agricultural and Environmental Journalists Network* on his farm on Monday, June 30, 2025, Mr. Sayetee shared how the intervention of STAR-P has expanded their farming operation from 12 acres to 54 acres — and, with new land acquisition, soon to 126 acres.

"Before STAR-P, we farmed on just 12 acres. With their support, we expanded to 54 acres and have since procured an additional 72 acres, where many community members are now actively working," said Mr. Sayetee. Click to read more

#### NaFAA Launches Aquaculture Training Program to Boost In-Land Fish Farming



As part of a national initiative to revitalize Liberia's aquaculture sector, the National Fisheries and Aquaculture Authority (NaFAA), with support from the World Bank through the *Liberia Sustainable Management of Fisheries Project*, has officially launched a comprehensive aquaculture training program targeting fish farmers across four key counties: Margibi, Bong, Lofa, and Nimba.

The first phase of the training commenced in Kakata City, Margibi County, with 50 fish farmers participating in a six-day intensive program. The Seinjeh Agricultural Production and Marketing (SAPM) Partnership Farm, once a modest subsistence-level operation in Senjeh District, Bomi County, has emerged as a model for mechanized, market-driven agriculture—thanks to transformative support from the Smallholder Agriculture Transformation and Agribusiness Revitalization Project (STAR-P), implemented by the Ministry of Agriculture with funding from the World Bank and International Fund for Agriculture Development (IFAD.

## Blessed Opportunities Farm Cultivates 50+ Hectares of Fruits in Margibi: A Model for Agro-Growth in Liberia



A bold move by a private Liberian agribusiness is redefining what's possible in Liberia's underutilized agriculture sector. Over **50 hectares of land** in Gorlorhuma Clan, Margibi County, have been cultivated with more than **29 varieties of fruit crops**—an initiative that signals both commercial opportunity and a pathway toward national food security.

At the helm of this growing venture is Mr. Jasper Z. Williams, CEO of Blessed Opportunities Farm Incorporated. The farm, just 30 minutes from Kakata, is not only producing a broad selection of fruits—including bananas, oranges, mangoes, avocados, pineapples, coconuts, lemons, and soursop—but also laying the groundwork for downstream processing and rural job creation. *Read more on this story* 

#### SANKOFA Farm Leads the Charge to Revive Liberia's Animal Husbandry Sector

As part of its agro-diversification drive, SANKOFA Farm has in recent years made significant investments in animal husbandry—expanding its focus beyond vegetable cultivation and crop production. Leading this bold shift is Nyamah G. Dunbar, a visionary agriculturalist who sees the revitalization of Liberia's livestock sector as essential to strengthening national food security and achieving true economic independence.



"We are sleeping on animal husbandry," Dunbar tells the Liberia Agricultural and Environmental Journalists Network, standing beside a pen of imported sheep and local cattle. "Liberians eat meat every day, but we rarely think about where it comes from—or how much of it we could be producing ourselves."

Liberia imports over 75% of its meat—much of it frozen poultry, low-quality beef, or expired pork from overseas, according to the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO). This not only raises health concerns but also drains the country's foreign exchange reserves. *Read more* 

### From Loss to Livelihood: Female Farmers Thrive with STAR-P Support in Nimba



In a compelling success story of rural empowerment, the Kwakehseh Rural Women Cooperative in Nimba County is celebrating a transformation, as a result of a partnership with the Smallholder Agricultural Transformation and Agribusiness Revitalization Project (STAR- P), a government-led initiative supported by the World Bank and International Fund for Agriculture Development (IFAD) .

Once struggling with high post-harvest losses and limited market access, the female-led farming cooperative now thrives—crediting STAR-P for not only improving their agricultural output but also increasing their income and impoving their livelihood.

Before the intervention of the STAR Project, the Kwakehseh group had fewer than 150 members. Today, its membership has grown to 350—**250 of whom are women**. The cooperative now serves as a beacon of gender-inclusive agribusiness, creating opportunities not only for women but also for men and youth.

Through the **STAR-P grant**, the group procured a 6 ton **mini-truck**, several **motorbikes**, and constructed a **modern warehouse**, drastically reducing their losses after harvest. *Click the link to read more*

The agricultural students at the River Gee County Vocational and Technical Training Institute (RGVTTI) are reaping more than just crops from their campus garden—they are demonstrating a model of adaptive learning, resource efficiency, and community-driven innovation in the face of persistent systemic challenges.

From its inception, the student-led garden was intended as a supplementary practical training activity aligned with the Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) curriculum. However, the initiative has evolved into a vital learning laboratory and a case study in low-resource resilience. Confronted with a lack of essential inputs—including basic hand tools, fertilizers, and seeds—the Agriculture Department was compelled to adopt innovative, context-appropriate solutions to maintain both the educational and productive value of the project. Dukuly International Farm and Mercy Corps Empower Young Farmers through Skill Development



As Liberia continues to grapple with food insecurity and rising youth unemployment, stakeholders in the agriculture sector are exploring more targeted interventions to attract young people to farming. One such initiative, recently completed by Dukuly International Farm in collaboration with Mercy Corps under the PROSPECT IV program, is demonstrating early signs of impact through the upskilling of young farmers in vegetable production.

The six-month training program, which ended this July, equipped 25 young participants—including women—with practical knowledge in Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) focused specifically on vegetable cultivation. Training modules covered key areas such as land preparation, seedling production, transplanting techniques, crop management, integrated pest management, and post-harvest handling. These components are critical for improving productivity and reducing post-harvest losses, which remain a major bottleneck in Liberia's horticulture sector. Read more

#### Ministry of Agriculture Strengthens Subsector Coordination to Drive Reform



As part of a strong commitment aimed at revitalizing Liberia's agriculture sector, the Ministry of Agriculture (MoA) has resumed and strengthened subsector coordination efforts through the reactivation of its Agriculture Coordination Committee (ACC). This strategic initiative, led by Mr. Peter D. Gbawoquiya, Director for Sectional Coordination at the Ministry, is designed to align stakeholders, improve efficiency, and address long-standing structural challenges within the sector.

Speaking to the Liberia Agricultural and Environmental Journalists Network in Monrovia recently, Director Gbawoquiya revealed that the Ministry is taking deliberate steps to enhance collaboration among subsector actors—ranging from crops and livestock to fisheries and agribusiness—under the renewed framework of the ACC and its technical working groups.

"Effective coordination is no longer optional. It is essential if we are to ensure that agriculture becomes a central driver of food security, employment, and economic growth," said Gbawoquiya. #### Liberia Reaffirms Commitment to Sustainable Food Systems at UNFSS+4 Summit in Ethiopia
