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#### Mainland Group Earmarks USD 100 Million Investment in Liberia's Agriculture Sector



The Mainland Group, a leading Chinese firm with extensive investments across Africa, has announced a significant USD 100 million initiative to revitalize Liberia's agriculture industry. This statement was delivered by Mr. Zhu Chen, President and CEO of the firm, during a live press conference held at the Ministry of Agriculture.

#### STAR-P Grant Boosts Rain Forest Agriculture Enterprise Oil Palm Production and Processing Capacity in Nimba



As Liberia continues to confront persistent food insecurity and underdeveloped agricultural value chains, one enterprise in Nimba County is showing what locally driven agribusiness transformation can look like. The **Rain Forest Agriculture Enterprise**, headquartered in Vayenglay Town, Soe Clan, Nimba County Electoral District- 4, has emerged as a growing force in rural development—linking smallholder farmers to markets, adding value through agro-processing, and delivering tangible social and economic returns.

Now bolstered by a **US\$60,000 grant** from the **Smallholder Agricultural Transformation and Agribusiness Revitalization Project (STAR-P)**, the organization is scaling up its kernel oil processing operations, addressing a critical gap in Liberia's oil palm value chain. STAR-P, a Government of Liberia initiative supported by the World Bank and the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), aims to catalyze agribusiness growth through targeted investments in rural producers, processors, and cooperatives. *Read more*

Corn growers in Lofa County continue to face significant barriers to profitable production, as a lack of buyers and market infrastructure limits the crop's potential despite growing demand in other sectors of Liberia's economy.

The 4 United Brothers Vegetables Agriculture has ventured into large-scale corn farming, planting four hectares of lowland corn at Koima Junction in Voinjama District.

The Government of Liberia is set to launch a national egg production program in October, creating a potential surge in demand for corn as a key poultry feed ingredient. # Bong Rural Women Farmers Celebrate Agriculture as a Life-Changing Opportunity

Women farmers in Sinyea Town, Bong County, are celebrating their involvement in agriculture, describing it as a transformative and life-changing experience. Many of them, particularly single mothers, say farming has become a beacon of hope and a path to self-reliance. Members of the Nee-A-Lah Farmers Group, a community-based farming initiative in Sinyea, Suakoko District, shared how agriculture has helped them transition from being dependent on others to becoming self-sufficient and empowered.

"I'm always happy to be in the field, working in the lowlands, tending to our vegetable garden. Everything about the group brings me joy," said Hellen Binda, one of the women thriving through community farming.



Statistics show that women form a significant part of Liberia's agricultural workforce. Up to 80% by some estimates. However, despite their labor, they contribute only 39% of market-based output, according to a World Bank report, underscoring the persistent gender gap in access to resources and income. #### Bâituogkhã Farmers Celebrate First Lowland Rice Harvest with STAR-P Support in River Gee County

The farming cooperative Bâituogkhã has proudly commenced the harvest of lowland rice in Tuobo Gbaweliken, Electoral District 3, River Gee County—an important milestone made possible through the support of the Smallholder Agriculture Transformation and Agribusiness Revitalization Project (STAR-P) under the Ministry of Agriculture.



In River Gee and other counties, STAR-P has become a vital driver of rural development, helping cooperatives like *Bâituogkhã* to scale up their activities and achieve sustainable growth. According to Tarlue, Tweh's encouragement and the Ministry's backing were decisive in helping the group cultivate six hectares of lowland rice, which they are now harvesting.

She described the collaborative farming model as a turning point for their community, emphasizing that before the support came, many farmers struggled with limited tools, poor-quality seeds, and the inability to

Over 500 Bags of Locally Processed Rice Launched for Sale in Gbarnga



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The Rice, Cassava and Vegetables Producers and Processors Union of Liberia has officially launched the sale of over 500 bags of locally processed rice in Bong County, in a move aimed at boosting domestic rice production and reducing Liberia's reliance on imported staples.

Branded as "Living Manna Rice," the 25-kilogram bags of parboiled and unparboiled rice are now available on the local market at \$16.50 per bag. The launch event took place on Friday, August 1, 2025, in Gbarnga, with key stakeholders from the agriculture sector and development partners in attendance.

Former Vice President **Jewel Howard-Taylor**, who performed the official launch, praised the initiative as a step toward achieving national food self-sufficiency. Bomi Smallholder Farmers Plead for Government Support to Boost Rice Production



A group of thirty subsistence farmers in rural Bomi County, united under the name "Bomujeh"—which means "Don't Sit" in the Gola dialect—are urgently appealing to the Liberian government and development partners for immediate assistance in bolstering their rice farming efforts.

The farmers, who are based in Bola Town, say their mission goes beyond personal survival. They aim to increase food production within their community and contribute to Liberia's broader goal of food self-sufficiency. This effort, they argue, will help reduce the country's long-standing dependence on imported rice, which has drained millions of dollars from the national economy and left ordinary Liberians vulnerable to price shocks on the global market. *Read more* 

# High Costs, Low Returns: The Reality of Domah-pa's Farmers

36-year-old Yei Dahn stoops to lift a basket of cabbage slick with dew, balances it on her head, and starts walking. The path out of her farm is a ribbon of laterite and mud that feeds into an even rougher feeder road. A motorbike, if she can find one, will cost almost as much as she hopes to earn before prices dip at the market in Gompa city.

"The cabbage can grow well here," she says, "but carrying it to the market is the hardest part. The money I spend on transport sometimes leaves me with almost nothing."



Across various farms and villages behind Domah-pa, farmers like Dhan cultivate rice, cabbage, peppers, bitter balls and greens with tools their grandparents would recognize. Most work by hand, intercropping and composting to stretch thin inputs. Extension support is sporadic; mechanization is rare. What drains their earnings most, they say, isn't the soil, it's the road. Susan Nanduddu Urges Africa to Put Adaptation and Finance at the Heart of Climate Action



Susan Nanduddu, Executive Director of the African Centre for Trade and Development (ACTADE), is urging African governments and development partners to prioritize adaptation and ensure climate finance reaches vulnerable communities. Speaking in an interview on Super Bongese Radio from Kampala, Wednesday, August 20,2025, she stressed that the worsening impacts of climate change are undoing decades of development progress across the continent.
